She has given all of her classes a Pen Pal Project, where they write letters to students at the school in which Senora Parra taught in Spain. When talking to her about this, she was so lively and excited about this project and is incredibly proud of her students.

The area in Spain they are writing to is La Zenia, and the high school is IES Playa Flamenca. She says that the school is kind of like Keota in the sense that people from surrounding areas come to this school; they don't all live in the one town. Senora Parra added that they recently rebuilt the school and she hasn't yet seen it in person. "La Zenia is a quiet place," she says, "with a lot of different types of people coming for holidays." Senora Parra says that the students in Spain will write back to the Keota students in English, since that is their foreign language.

This is a long term project with five parts to it. Their first letter will be going out soon, introducing themselves to one another. The second will talk about their school, their classes, and activities. The third one will be all about their family lives and what they do for the holidays. The fourth will be about the towns that they live in, and finally the fifth will be about their plans for the summer months.

Senora Parra says that she did this to give the students something real, as she wanted to give them real contact with Spanish speakers. She says that they can make friends from this project and all the students can learn more about each other's country. It is very important to her that her students have a real connection to another student in Spain.

Senora Parra was beaming with pride by the end of the conversation. She said that they have all done so well with their first letter, and she was very impressed. We all hope that the students are as excited about this Pen Pal Project as she is, and that they can create new friends in this endeavor.


